# The Collect of the Day

Almighty God, you know that we have no power in ourselves to help ourselves: Keep us both outwardly in our bodies and inwardly in our souls, that we may be defended from all adversities which may happen to the body, and from all evil thoughts which may assault and hurt the soul; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. *Amen.* 

# The First Lesson: Exodus 20:1-17 please be seated.

Note: The Ten Commandments are here and repeated in Deuteronomy 5 in a slightly different form. They are more than just rules, there is a spirit in them that shapes human life, and which is reiterated by Jesus in his Summary of the Law (Mark 12), taken from Deuteronomy and Leviticus (love God and neighbor). They are all meant to shape our lives by and for the presence of God: "you shall be a kingdom of priests and holy nation" (Exodus 19:6)

# Then God spoke all these words:

and keep my commandments.

I am the LORD your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery; you shall have no other gods before me. You shall not make for yourself an idol, whether in the form of anything that is in heaven above, or that is on the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth. You shall not bow down to them or worship them; for I the LORD your God am a jealous God, punishing children for the iniquity of parents, to the third and the fourth generation of those who reject me, but showing steadfast love to the thousandth generation of those who love me

You shall not make wrongful use of the name of the LORD your God, for the LORD will not acquit anyone who misuses his name.

Remember the sabbath day, and keep it holy. For six days you shall labour and do all your work. But the seventh day is a sabbath to the LORD your God; you shall not do any work—you, your son or your daughter, your male or female slave, your livestock, or the alien resident in your towns. For in six days the LORD made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that is in them, but rested the seventh day; therefore the LORD blessed the sabbath day and consecrated it.

Honor your father and your mother, so that your days may be long in the land that the LORD your God is giving you.

You shall not murder.

You shall not commit adultery.

You shall not steal.

You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor.

You shall not covet your neighbor's house; you shall not covet your neighbor's wife, or male or female slave, or ox, or donkey, or anything that belongs to your neighbor.

# Psalm 19

Note: This psalm begins with the daily pattern and ritual of life and incorporates that pattern in the shaping of our understanding a reverence of God. Each day reinforces the presence of God if we open our eyes and ears to the work of his hands.

1 The heavens declare the glory of God, \* and the firmament shows his handiwork.

- 2 One day tells its tale to another, \* and one night imparts knowledge to another.
- 3 Although they have no words or language, and their voices are not heard.
- 4 Their sound has gone out into all lands, \* and their message to the ends of the world.
- 5 In the deep has he set a pavilion for the sun; \*
  it comes forth like a bridegroom out of his chamber;
  it rejoices like a champion to run its course.
- 6 It goes forth from the uttermost edge of the heavens and runs about to the end of it again; \* nothing is hidden from its burning heat.
- 7 The law of the LORD is perfect and revives the soul; \* the testimony of the LORD is sure and gives wisdom to the innocent.
- 8 The statutes of the LORD are just and rejoice the heart; \* the commandment of the LORD is clear and gives light to the eyes.
- 9 The fear of the LORD is clean and endures for ever; \* the judgments of the LORD are true and righteous altogether.
- 10 More to be desired are they than gold, more than much fine gold, \* sweeter far than honey, than honey in the comb.

- 13 Above all, keep your servant from presumptuous sins; let them not get dominion over me; \* then shall I be whole and sound, and innocent of a great offense.

# The Epistle: 1 Corinthians 1:18-25

Note: The church in Corinth was beset by divisions of class, wealth, pride, and, above all, spiritual snobbery. Paul cuts right through this by basically saying we are all fools for Christ. We are all in this together in a world that thinks we are crazy, silly, and maybe even slightly dangerous. Only the fool for Christ can become the child of God.

The message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. For it is written,

"I will destroy the wisdom of the wise,

and the discernment of the discerning I will thwart."

Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, God decided, through the foolishness of our proclamation, to save those who believe. For Jews demand signs and Greeks desire wisdom, but we proclaim Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, but to those who are the called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. For God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength.

# The Gospel: John 2:13-22

Note: The temple was the second to occupy the spot, replacing the first one built by Solomon and destroyed by the Babylonians. This second one was built about 500 years later with the return from Babylon and was expanded and greatly enhanced by Herod the Great in the beginning of the Christian era. It was an ancient wonder of the world, the center of the Hebrew people, and the pride of the priests and the aristocracy. A threat against it was a threat to the whole order.

The Passover of the Jews was near, and Jesus went up to Jerusalem. In the temple he found people selling cattle, sheep, and doves, and the money changers seated at their tables. Making a whip of cords, he drove all of them out of the temple, both the sheep and the cattle. He also poured out the coins of the money changers and overturned their tables. He told those who were selling the doves, "Take these things out of here! Stop making my Father's house a marketplace!" His disciples remembered that it was written, "Zeal for your house will consume me." The Jews then said to him, "What sign can you show us for doing this?" Jesus answered them, "Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up." The Jews then said, "This temple has been under construction for forty-six years, and will you raise it up in three days?" But he was speaking of the temple of his body. After he was raised from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this; and they believed the scripture and the word that Jesus had spoken.

#### **Urgent Love**

We often hear how important it is for us to "repent and return to the Lord". We hear how urgent it is for us. We also might consider that it is also urgent for Je-

During the cleansing of the temple Jesus drives out the animals brought to sell to pilgrims for sacrifice and turns over the tables of the moneychangers. It is sometimes thought of as the quintessential example of the anger of Jesus, giving us a good excuse to be righteously indignant when the urge comes upon us.

But what if is not anger (he does not, after all, attack anyone) so much as urgency. The disciples remember it as "zeal" (a quote from Psalm 69:10). He is passionate not in his opposition to the people, but in his love for them.

The temple is the sign of the presence of the living God in their lives, the God who has promised to be with them unconditionally (the promise/covenant to Noah and his family) and abundantly (the promise/covenant to Abraham and Sarah). The biggest problem is them. The biggest problem is us.

The cleansing of the temple is a sign that in Christ the meaning of the temple and the idea of sacrifice is about to change radically for the followers of Jesus. It is no coincidence that this action leads directly to the cross and the resurrection. Jesus rises to become the new temple, the dwelling place of God.

In this new temple there will be no buying or selling, no transacting for the presence of God for God will be freely present to everyone, always. The only problem is us. Will we accept the free gift of God, as a free gift, and pass it along to seal the bargain?

Jesus' urgency is his love for all of us, without exception. He urges us to share that urgency for the sake of the world.
