Gracious Father, whose blessed Son Jesus Christ came down from heaven to be the true bread which gives life to the world: Evermore give us this bread, that he may live in us, and we in him; who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

The First Lesson: Joshua 5:9-12

Note: Joshua, as Moses' successor, leads the people of Israel into the land promised by God after the long journey through the wilderness from their slavery in Egypt. It is, in essence, a return to the place of the ancient ancestors, of Abraham and Sarah and their children and arandchildren.

The Lord said to Joshua, "Today I have rolled away from you the disgrace of Egypt." And so that place is called Gilgal to this day.

While the Israelites were camped in Gilgal they kept the passover in the evening on the fourteenth day of the month in the plains of Jericho. On the day after the passover, on that very day, they ate the produce of the land, unleavened cakes and parched grain. The manna ceased on the day they ate the produce of the land, and the Israelites no longer had manna; they ate the crops of the land of Canaan that year.

Psalm 32 Beati quorum

Note: This psalm celebrates a God that welcomes back those that have gone astray. It contrasts the bitter reality of being separated from God with the supreme joy of finding oneself renewed again in God's presence.

- 1 Happy are they whose transgressions are forgiven, * and whose sin is put away!
- 2 Happy are they to whom the Lord imputes no guilt, * and in whose spirit there is no guile!

- 3 While I held my tongue, my bones withered away, because of my groaning all day long.
- 4 For your hand was heavy upon me day and night; * my moisture was dried up as in the heat of summer.
- 5 Then I acknowledged my sin to you, * and did not conceal my guilt.
- 6 I said," I will confess my transgressions to the Lord." ' Then you forgave me the guilt of my sin.
- 7 Therefore all the faithful will make their prayers to you in time of trouble; * when the great waters overflow, they shall not reach them.
- 8 You are my hiding-place; you preserve me from trouble; * you surround me with shouts of deliverance.
- g "I will instruct you and teach you in the way that you should go; " I will guide you with my eye.
- 10 Do not be like horse or mule, which have no understanding; * who must be fitted with bit and bridle, or else they will not stay near you."
- 11 Great are the tribulations of the wicked; * but mercy embraces those who trust in the Lord.
- 12 Be glad, you righteous, and rejoice in the Lord; * shout for joy, all who are true of heart.

The Epistle: 2 Corinthians 5:16-21

Note: Paul often talks about being "in" Christ. It carries the sense of deep personal connection with the larger life of God. Here he speaks of the practical implications of this orientation, that one not only sees Christ differently, but sees the world differently. Being in Christ changes the world from a place of inevitable conflict and despair into a place full of the possibility of love and reconciliation. How we ordinarily see the world could be a clue to just how much we are "in" Christ and how much more there may be to discover.

From now on, we regard no one from a human point of view; even though we once knew Christ from a human point of view, we know him no longer in that way. If anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new! All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation; that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting the message of reconciliation to us. So we are ambassadors for Christ, since God is making his appeal through us; we entreat you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God.

The Gospel: Luke 15:1-3, 11b-32

Note: Keep in mind that the parable of the Prodigal Son is the third parable about finding the lost that Jesus tells in response to the Pharisees' complaint about who he was eating with: tax collectors and sinners. What does this parable tell us about ordinary hospitality? About outsiders and insiders? About the radical nature of Jesus' invitation?

All the tax collectors and sinners were coming near to listen to Jesus. And the Pharisees and the scribes were grumbling and saying, "This fellow welcomes sinners and eats with them."

So Jesus told them this parable:

"There was a man who had two sons. The younger of them said to his father, 'Father, give me the share of the property that will belong to me. So he divided his property between them. A few days later the younger son gathered all he had and traveled to a distant country, and there he squandered his property in dissolute living. When he had spent everything, a severe famine took place throughout that country, and he began to be in need. So he went and hired himself out to one of the citizens of that country, who sent him to his fields to feed the pigs. He would gladly have filled himself with the

pods that the pigs were eating; and no one gave him anything. But when he came to himself he said, 'How many of my father's hired hands have bread enough and to spare, but here I am dying of hunger! I will get up and go to my father, and I will say to him, "Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; I am no longer worthy to be called your son; treat me like one of your hired hands." So he set off and went to his father. But while he was still far off, his father saw him and was filled with compassion; he ran and put his arms around him and kissed him. Then the son said to him, Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; I am no longer worthy to be called your son.' But the father said to his slaves, 'Quickly, bring out a robe--the best one--and put it on him; put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. And get the fatted calf and kill it, and let us eat and celebrate; for this son of mine was dead and is alive again; he was lost and is found!' And they began to celebrate.

"Now his elder son was in the field; and when he came and approached the house, he heard music and dancing. He called one of the slaves and asked what was going on. He replied, 'Your brother has come, and your father has killed the fatted calf, because he has got him back safe and sound. Then he became angry and refused to go in. His father came out and began to plead with him. But he answered his father, 'Listen! For all these years I have been working like a slave for you, and I have never disobeyed your command; yet you have never given me even a young goat so that I might celebrate with my friends. But when this son of yours came back, who has devoured your property with prostitutes, you killed the fatted calf for him!' Then the father said to him, 'Son, you are always with me, and all that is mine is yours. But we had to celebrate and rejoice, because this brother of yours was dead and has come to life; he was lost and has been found."

A Dysfunctional Lenten Feast

This Sunday is Laetare Sunday. It marks a slightly different approach to the solemn season of Lent by bringing into focus an element of rejoicing in anticipation of the end of the fast and inevitable beginning of a feast.

The gospel lesson offers a glimmer of this rejoicing. Here we have one of Jesus' parables that leads to a famous, if somewhat complicated, feast. The parable goes by many names but is probably best known as the parable of the Prodigal Son. It has also been called the parable of the Forgiving Father or the parable of the Resentful Older Brother. It all depends on how you want to explain the story.

The feast in question is complicated because it celebrates the return of the person who has caused all the problems in the family. Further, it is given by a father that doesn't seem to care about the misbehavior and imposes no consequences for it. Finally, the feast is given in the face of an angry older brother who sees himself as the only responsible person in the household.

Now *that* is some substantive Lenten rejoicing, full of a dysfunctional brew of open enmity, questionable motives, and unconditional joy.

It is a story we are drawn into because it speaks to us all on some personal level. It may make us rage against the unfairness of it all. It may remind us of our own irresponsible seasons. It may make us wonder about the limits of our own capacity for forgiveness.

And, like many of the parables of Jesus, we don't know how it ends. The whole situation seems unresolved. Only we can complete the story.


