Almighty God, whose blessed Son was led by the Spirit to be tempted by Satan: Come quickly to help us who are assaulted by many temptations; and, as you know the weaknesses of each of us, let each one find you mighty to save; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

### The First Lesson: Genesis 9:8-17

Note: The covenant made by God to Noah promises to stay with his people even though God knows there has not been a fundamental change in human nature. God has however, in a sense, changed. Hurt as God is from the willful destruction of his good creation by human beings, God will be patient with them.

God said to Noah and to his sons with him, "As for me, I am establishing my covenant with you and your descendants after you, and with every living creature that is with you, the birds, the domestic animals, and every animal of the earth with you, as many as came out of the ark. I establish my covenant with you, that never again shall all flesh be cut off by the waters of a flood, and never again shall there be a flood to destroy the earth." God said, "This is the sign of the covenant that I make between me and you and every living creature that is with you, for all future generations: I have set my bow in the clouds, and it shall be a sign of the covenant between me and the earth. When I bring clouds over the earth and the bow is seen in the clouds, I will remember my covenant that is between me and you and every living creature of all flesh; and the waters shall never again become a flood to

destroy all flesh. When the bow is in the clouds, I will see it and remember the everlasting covenant between God and every living creature of all flesh that is on the earth." God said to Noah, "This is the sign of the covenant that I have established between me and all flesh that is on the earth."

### The Psalm 25:1-9

Note: A song imploring our compassionate and loving God to reveal to us frail human beings how we might reveal in ourselves more of the nature of that same God.

### Ad te, Domine, levavi

1 To you, O LORD, I lift up my soul; my God, I put my trust in you; \* let me not be humiliated. nor let my enemies triumph over me.

2 Let none who look to you be put to shame; \* let the treacherous be disappointed in their schemes.

3 Show me your ways, O Lord, \* and teach me your paths.

4 Lead me in your truth and teach me, \* for you are the God of my salvation;

in you have I trusted all the day long.

5 Remember, O Lord, your compassion and love, \* for they are from everlasting.

6 Remember not the sins of my youth and my transgressions; \* remember me according to your love and for the sake of your goodness, O LORD.

7 Gracious and upright is the LORD; ' therefore he teaches sinners in his way.

8 He guides the humble in doing right ' and teaches his way to the lowly.

9 All the paths of the LORD are love and faithfulness \* to those who keep his covenant and his testimonies.

## The Epistle: 1 Peter 3:18-22

Note: Here the letter makes a direct comparison between the experience of Noah and baptism. In Martin Luther's baptismal lituraies, still found in the 1662 Book of Common Prayer, he refers to this as well. Baptismal dying and rising in Christ reveals a new creation and a renewed covenant in the newly baptized.

Christ also suffered for sins once for all, the righteous for the unrighteous, in order to bring you to God. He was put to death in the flesh, but made alive in the spirit, in which also he went and made a proclamation to the spirits in prison, who in former times did not obey, when God waited patiently in the days of Noah, during the building of the ark, in which a few, that is, eight persons, were saved through water. And baptism, which this prefigured, now saves you-- not as a removal of dirt from the body, but as an appeal to God for a good conscience, through the resurrection of Jesus Christ, who has gone into heaven and is at the right hand of God, with angels, authorities, and powers made subject to him.

### The Holy Gospel: Mark 1:9-15

Note: In all four gospels Jesus goes right from his baptism and the divine declaration of his identity into the wilderness and temptation. Our baptismal life, the promised presence of God in our lives, protects us from becoming part of a world which rebels against God's creation.

In those days Jesus came from Nazareth of Galilee and was baptized by John in the Jordan. And just as he was coming up out of the water, he saw the heavens torn apart and the Spirit descending like a dove on him. And a voice came from heaven, "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased."

And the Spirit immediately drove him out into the wilderness. He was in the wilderness forty days, tempted by Satan; and he was with the wild beasts; and the angels waited on him.

Now after John was arrested, Jesus came to Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God, and saying, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news."

### The Promise of God in Jesus Christ: **Lenten Sermon Series**

The God of scripture, both Old and New Testament is a promising God. By that I mean in God is hope for the present and the future. Moreover, God is promising in this sense because he is promising in another sense, God is promising because God has made promises. In the language of the Bible, we call these covenants.

The most famous covenants began with the patriarchs and matriarchs like Adam and Eve, Noah and his family, Abraham and Sarah, and with David and the climactic covenant moment found in the event of Jesus Christ which was written so forcefully about by St. Paul in his contrast between the law and the gospel.

What is this promise, this covenant? It has been expressed very simply and succinctly in Genesis and Exodus and in the prophets (Ezekiel, Jeremiah, Hosea) as the same or similar words from Jeremiah 7:23: "I will be your God and you shall be my people". It is God's promise never to abandon us, expressed in various ways and circumstances.

In Jesus we see this promise incarnated, where God comes and dwells among us in order to direct us toward a perfected sacrificial union between God and human beings through his body and blood which he offers to us. Baptism is the acceptance of

As disciples of Jesus, we have signed on to the promise of God. Just as God has promised to be with us, we have prioritized the life of God in our own lives by the power of the grace God himself gives us. We have been recruited into God's great project of making his loving will a present reality on earth as it is in heaven.

We are, therefore, promising people. We show promise in ourselves by the love of God working in us for the sake of the world. We are the people of God in Christ.

Lent is a time to explore that promise and wonder and to see where in our lives that promise can shed a little more light in the world.
