The Collect of the Day

Almighty God, who through your only-begotten Son Jesus Christ overcame death and opened to us the gate of everlasting life: Grant that we, who celebrate with joy the day of the Lord's resurrection, may be raised from the death of sin by your lifegiving Spirit; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

The First Lesson: Acts 10:34-43 seated

Note: The season of Easter traditionally includes a reading from the Acts of the Apostles each Sunday. Peter's speech is a thumbnail sketch of the meaning of Jesus and how that meaning informs our life after the resurrection. What short answer would you have if somebody were to ask you about the meaning of Jesus in your life?

Peter began to speak to Cornelius and the other Gentiles: "I truly understand that God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ--he is Lord of all. That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name."

The Psalm: 118:1-2, 14-24 Confitemini Domino

Note: This is a psalm of the victory of God. The resurrection is a sign of this victory, that, against all odds, God has triumphed in Jesus Christ. This is more than a fact; it is the posture of the human heart. To believe in the triumph of God is to see the world differently, to see ourselves differently. It is live in defiant hope in

The Epistle: 1 Corinthians 15:1-11

Note: Paul did not know Jesus before the resurrection. The resurrection changed everything for him. Jesus is now available to all of us and prepared to work his grace into our lives. For Paul, Jesus became a major part of his biography. How has the risen Christ informed your life?

I would remind you, brothers and sisters, of the good news that I proclaimed to you, which you in turn received, in which also you stand, through which also you are being saved, if you hold firmly to the message that I proclaimed to you--unless you have come to believe in vain.

For I handed on to you as of first importance what I in turn had received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures, and that he was buried, and that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the scriptures, and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers and sisters at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have died. Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. Last of all, as to one untimely born, he appeared also to me. For I am the least of the apostles, unfit to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God. But by the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace toward me has not been in vain. On the contrary, I worked harder than any of them--though it was not I, but the grace of God that is with me. Whether then it was I or they, so we proclaim and so you have come to believe.

Holy Gospel: John 20:1-18 please stand as able

Note: The resurrection is the climactic point of all four gospels. Each has their own way of telling the story. All of them involve women as the first to experience the risen Christ. The women become the first evangelists, which was the last thing on their mind as they went to the tomb that morning. But God surprised them, and their lives were changed. How has God surprised you?

Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb. So she ran and went to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved, and said to them, "They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him." Then Peter and the other disciple set out and went toward the tomb. The two were running together, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. He bent down to look in and saw the linen wrappings lying there, but he did not go in. Then Simon Peter came, following him, and went into the tomb. He saw the linen wrappings lying there, and the cloth that had been on Jesus' head, not lying with the linen wrappings but rolled up in a place by itself. Then the other disciple, who reached the tomb first, also went in, and he saw and believed; for as yet they did not understand the scripture, that he must rise from the dead. Then the disciples returned to

But Mary stood weeping outside the tomb. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb; and she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had been lying, one at the head and the other at the feet. They said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping?" She said to them, "They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him." When she had said this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping? Whom are you looking for?" Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away." Jesus said to her, "Mary!" She turned and said to him in Hebrew, "Rabbouni!" (which means Teacher).

Jesus said to her, "Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them, I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God." Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, "I have seen the Lord"; and she told them that he had said these things to her.

A New Start

The resurrection of Jesus Christ means a new start. After Good Friday this seemed unlikely. Hopes had been raised. The disciples had good reason to believe that the world would change, just as they had changed. Then, suddenly, those hopes were dashed.

Hope was dashed suddenly, but not inexplicably. Jesus' life was a constant tension between works of love and growing opposition. He was a dangerous man because he sought more than the world was ready to give him. His death seemed an all too natural consequence of his actions and teachings to a world obstinate to cling on to its own self-destructive behavior.

Easter tells us we have another chance. It also tells us that we are worth it, despite the evidence of Good Friday. More, we are invited to learn, was resurrected that day than one human being. Our hope was raised.

Hope, it cannot be said too often, is not the same as optimism. We are not merely optimistic because of the resurrection. That would simply mean we expect better according to our experience. Hope, on the other hand, goes far beyond our experience and enters the providence of God. In the resurrection we are invited to see the hand of God doing things beyond our experience or imagination.

What new start is God drawing you toward? You might find yourself as surprised as the disciples.
