The Collect

Almighty and everlasting God, increase in us the gifts of faith, hope, and charity; and, that we may obtain what you promise, make us love what you command; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

The First Lesson: Jeremiah 14:7 10, 19-22

Note: Although this 7th c. BC prophet was well known for his critique of the religious practices of his people in his time, here he leads a prayer in a time of drought, trusting in the mercy of God, regardless of the many faults of the people.

Although our iniquities testify against us, act, O Lord, for your name's sake;

our apostasies indeed are many,

and we have sinned against you.

O hope of Israel,

its savior in time of trouble.

why should you be like a stranger in the land,

like a traveler turning aside for the night? Why should you be like someone confused,

like a mighty warrior who cannot give help?

Yet you, O Lord, are in the midst of us,

and we are called by your name; do not forsake us!

Thus says the Lord concerning this people:

Truly they have loved to wander,

they have not restrained their feet;

therefore the Lord does not accept them,

now he will remember their iniquity

and punish their sins.

Have you completely rejected Judah?

Does your heart loathe Zion?

Why have you struck us down

so that there is no healing for us?

We look for peace, but find no good; for a time of healing, but there is terror instead.

We acknowledge our wickedness, O Lord,

the iniquity of our ancestors,

for we have sinned against you.

Do not spurn us, for your name's sake,

do not dishonor your glorious throne;

remember and do not break your covenant with us.

Can any idols of the nations bring rain?

Or can the heavens give showers?

Is it not you, O Lord our God?

We set our hope on you,

for it is you who do all this.

Psalm 84:1-6 Quam dilecta!

Note: This beautiful psalm is a moment of tranquil peace in the midst of some hard words in our other readings. God, it seems to sing, is always our refuge.

1 How dear to me is your dwelling, O Lord of hosts! * My soul has a desire and longing for the courts of the Lord; my heart and my flesh rejoice in the living God.

2 The sparrow has found her a house

and the swallow a nest where she may lay her young; * by the side of your altars, O Lord of hosts, my King and my God.

3 Happy are they who dwell in your house! * they will always be praising you.

4 Happy are the people whose strength is in you! * whose hearts are set on the pilgrims' way.

5 Those who go through the desolate valley will find it a place of springs, * for the early rains have covered it with pools of water.

6 They will climb from height to height. * and the God of gods will reveal himself in Zion.

The Epistle: 2 Timothy 4:6-8, 16-18

Note: Here is our final reading from this letter and a fitting one. Here Paul seems to send his last greeting, anticipating both the end of his ministry and of his life, rejoicing finally in hope.

I am already being poured out as a libation, and the time of my departure has come. I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith. From now on there is reserved for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, will give me on that day, and not only to me but also to all who have longed for his appearing.

At my first defense no one came to my support, but all deserted me. May it not be counted against them! But the Lord stood by me and gave me strength, so that through me the message might be fully proclaimed and all the Gentiles might hear it. So I was rescued from the lion's mouth. The Lord will rescue me from every evil attack and save me for his heavenly kingdom. To him be the glory forever and ever. Amen.

The Gospel: Luke 18:9-14

Note: Pharisees and tax collectors become something of stereotypes in the gospels, the former representing the "respectable" religious elite and the latter representing the reviled Roman collaborators in collecting the hated tax of the occupying power. Jesus introduces this parable with a warning. Is the warning for the Pharisee or for us?

Jesus told this parable to some who trusted in themselves that they were righteous and regarded others with contempt: "Two men went up to the temple to pray, one a Pharisee and the other a tax collector. The Pharisee. standing by himself, was praying thus, 'God, I thank you that I am not like other people: thieves, roques, adulterers, or even like this tax collector. I fast twice a week; I give a tenth of all my income. But the tax collector, standing far off, would not even look up to heaven, but was beating his breast and saying, 'God, be merciful to me, a sinner!' I tell you, this man went down to his home justified rather than the other; for all who exalt themselves will be humbled, but all who humble themselves will be exalted."

Meddling Prayer

I wrote last week about being persistent in prayer regardless of the circumstances around us, like that irrepressible widow banging on the door of the unjust judge. Jesus offers us another parable about prayer which may stray a little from preaching to meddling.

The pharisee and the tax collector are contrasted as they pray in the temple, the pharisee condescendingly eying the more sinful posture of the tax collector. Be that as it may, there is one thing they both share about the nature of prayer itself: it is not only a revelation of God, but also a revelation of ourselves.

To pray is to posture ourselves toward the living God. We might try to put our best face forward. On the other hand, we might be so filled with remorse and regret that we can hardly stand the experience. In either case, God sees through it all. And if we acknowledge that we stand without explanation before God, our prayer has a beginning.

I remember sitting with a woman of our parish when she was dying. "It is what it is", she said. Not an expression of despair, but an acceptance of the fact of her condition, without a whisper of the loss of her faith. Whoever we are, whatever circumstances we find ourselves in, God is present. We can face the truth of who we are because God is love.

And because God is love there is always a new beginning, even if we have begun again a hundred times before. Prayer teaches us that the future begins where we are, not where we would like to be, or think we should be, or wherever somebody else thinks we should be

Prayer is an invitation to Jesus to meddle in our lives. And because prayer always moves toward revealing ourselves as we truly are, Jesus takes us by the hand and leads us gently to whom we truly can become.

Prayer always begins and ends in the presence of Jesus, who, when the rich young man approached him "looked upon him and loved him" (Mark 10:21).
